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1. Logging in – Creating a new account

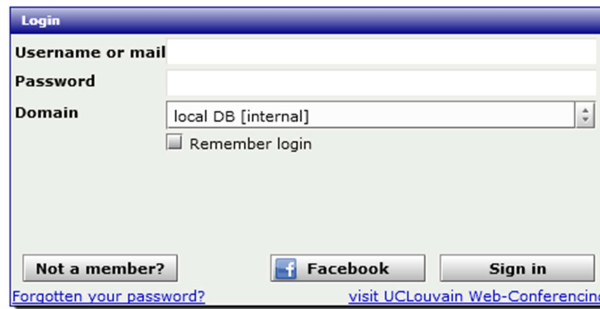


Figure 1 – Login window

When you connect to the server, this is the first window that appears. This is where you enter your username and password if you already have an account in the system. Otherwise, provided that the administrator has enabled this button, you can register (see Figure 2) and create a new account. You can also log into the system using your Facebook ID, this also provided that the system administrator has enabled this feature.

After entering your details, click the **Register** button to create your account. Depending on the parameters set by the administrator, you will receive an email containing a link you that you must click to confirm your registration.

Openmeetings allows the creation of user groups; it is possible for a user to be part of more than one group. In that case, when logging in, the user will see this window, asking him to choose the group in which he wants to log into for this session.

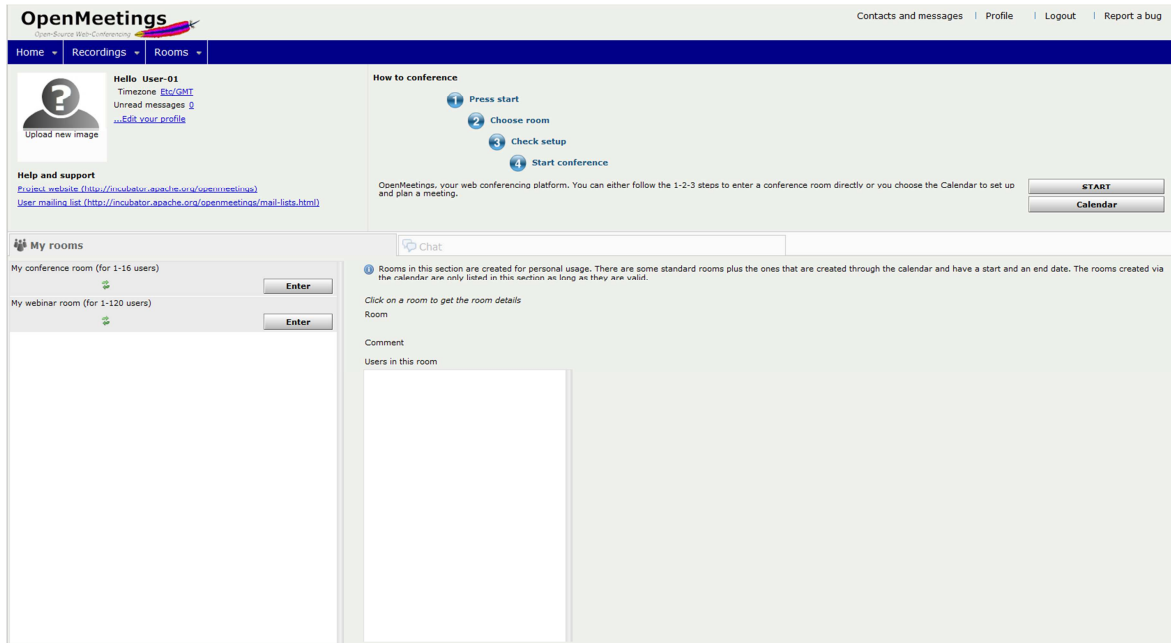


Figure 4 – Welcome window

This is the home window of OpenMeetings; it consists of several elements that we are going to review...

2. Editing your profile

The first thing to do after connecting for the first time to the system is to edit your profile to complete it. You can do this by clicking on the 'Edit your profile' link top left of the screen.

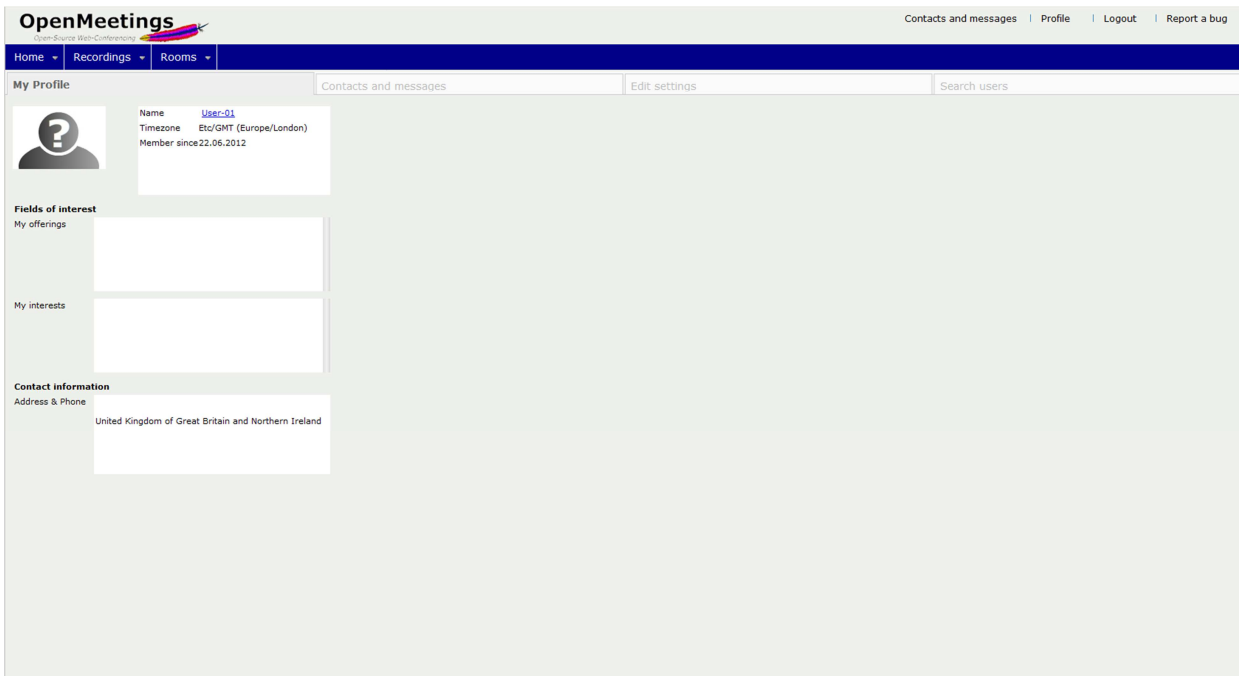


Figure 5 – My profile window

The profile window shows your profile as it is for the moment. It also has three other tabs 'Contacts and messages', 'Edit settings' and 'Search Users'. This page can also be accessed via the link 'Profile' at the top right of the window anywhere in the system.

Let's first see the 'Edit settings' tab.

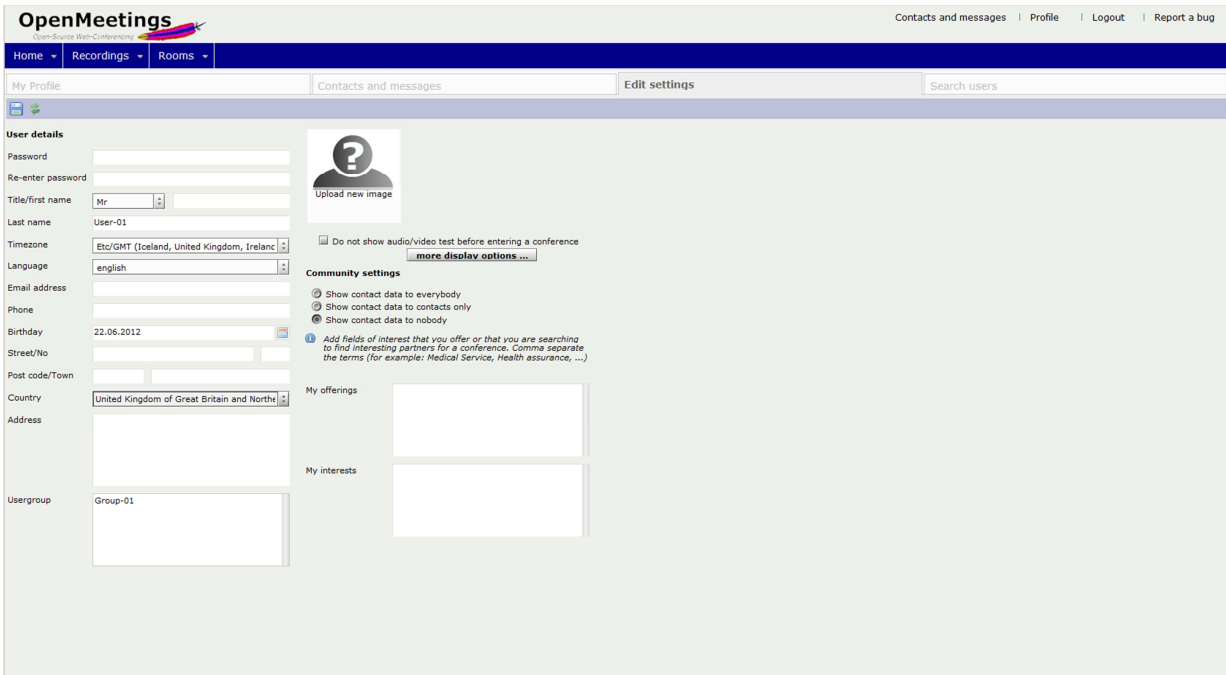
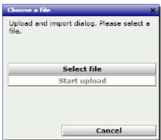


Figure 6 – Edit profile settings window

This is where you can complete your details and indicate whether you wish this information to be visible or invisible to other users of the system. You can also change your password in this screen.

By clicking on 'Upload New Image', a new window allows you to import an image from your computer. (Click on 'Select File', select the desired file on your computer and click 'Start upload')




That image will be displayed in your profile, in the chat room and in the conference room if you do not use a camera.

As its name says, the button 'more display options' opens a window that allows you to enable or disable certain options that do not require further explanation here.



When you enter a conference room, a self-test window is displayed. Here you can disable this window so it does not appear in the future anymore.



When you're finished completing your information, click the disk icon  in the top left of the window to save your changes.

3. Contacts and messages

The 'Contacts and messages' tab of your profile window can also be accessed via the 'Contacts and messages' link at the top right of the window anywhere in the system.

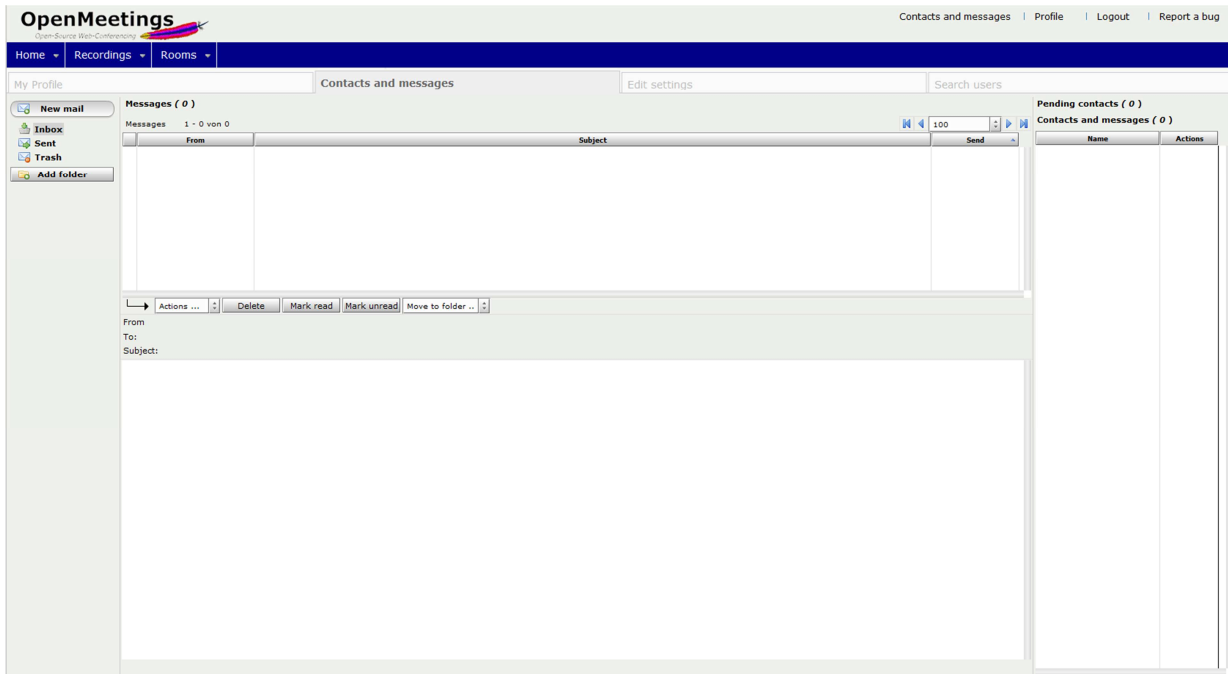


Figure 7 - Contacts and messages window

Here is your message board (we will not go into details here) and a list of your contacts. To see a contact in your list, you must first ask the user to approve you as a contact. At the right of this window is the list of contacts on hold, i.e. the list of persons wishing to have you as a contact and that you have not yet approved. This is where you can approve or refuse people as contacts.

4. Search users

The third tab of your profile page is the 'Search users' tab. This is where you can search for registered users in the system by entering free text or on the basis of interests that users have indicated in their profile page. When you find a user, you can, by clicking on the icons in the 'Actions' column, see his profile, send him a message or add him to your contact list. As explained above, adding a user to your contact list does not actually add him, a message is sent telling him you want to add him to your contact list, and he is then free to accept or refuse. Only if he agrees will his name effectively be added to your contact list.

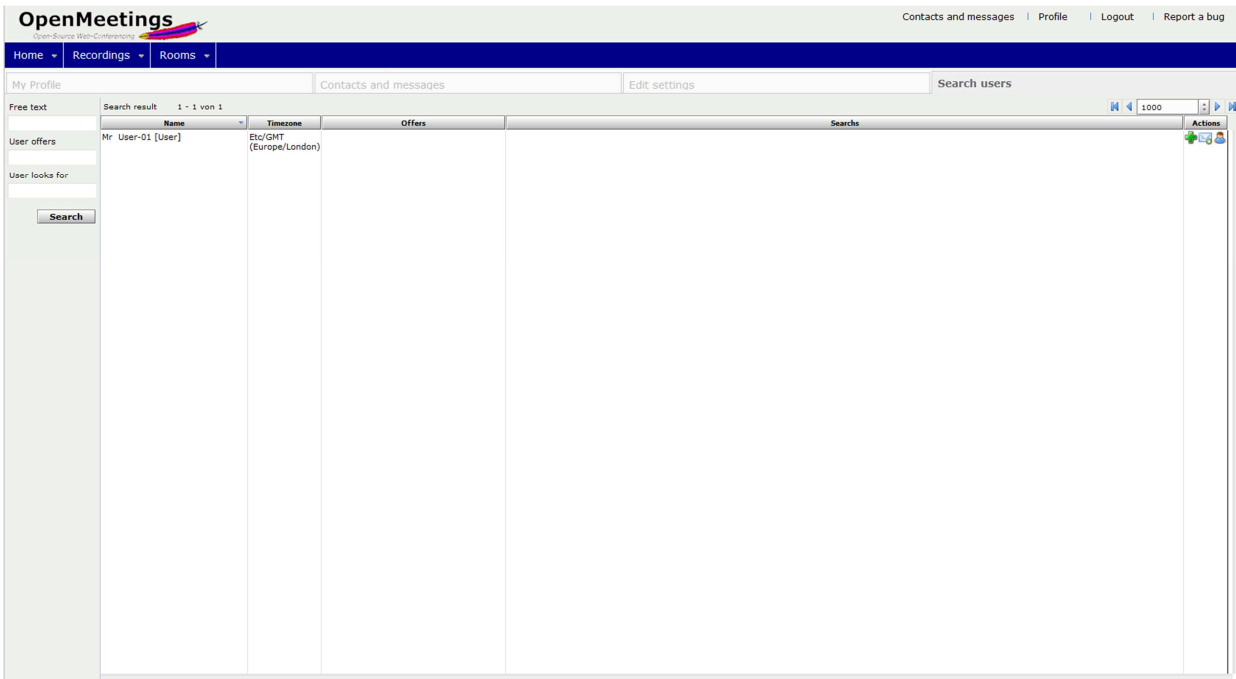


Figure 8 – Search users window

5. Chat

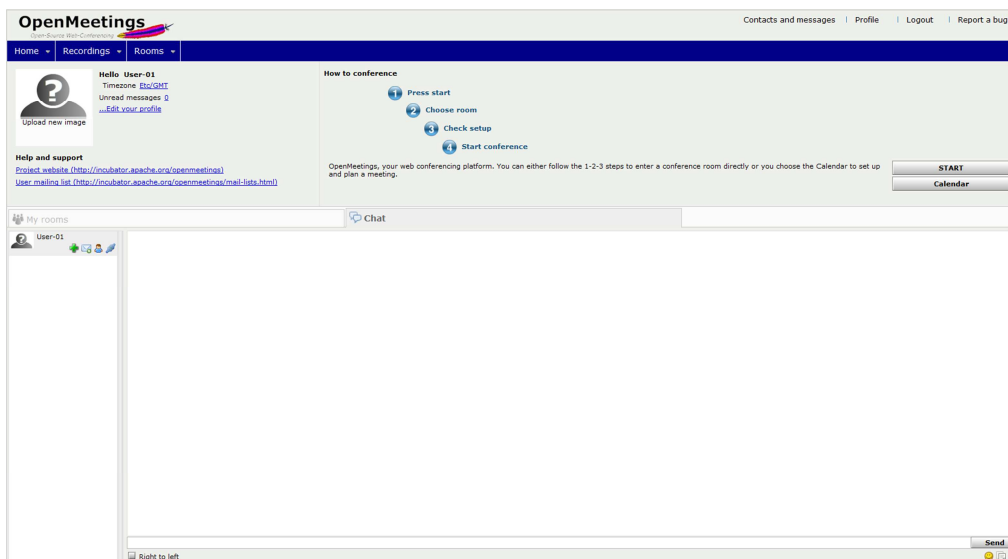


Figure 9 – Chat window

Your homepage also has a 'Chat' tab which requires no further explanation.

Let's go back to your home page (see figure 4), you'll maybe see a 'My rooms' tab.




These are rooms created automatically when creating the account. This option can be disabled by the site administrator; in that case, you will not see this tab.

6. Types of users

There are three types of users. The first is the administrator, the person who manages and configures the system (general parameters, the rooms, users, etc.). He has the right to do anything anywhere in the system. The second type is the simple user, he can access different page, he may enter a room and interact according to the rights granted to him and dependent on the type of room in which he is (see point 7). Finally, there are the moderators. Moderators are power users, they are usually (but not necessarily) the ones who are the organizers of conferences. They have the right to do everything in a room and have the ability to give the rights to interact to other users in the room. They can also give the moderator status to a regular user of the room. We will see that later in the manual.

7. Rooms

On your homepage, you have two options to join a conference room. Either you click on the  button, or you go to the 'Rooms' menu at the top left of the window.

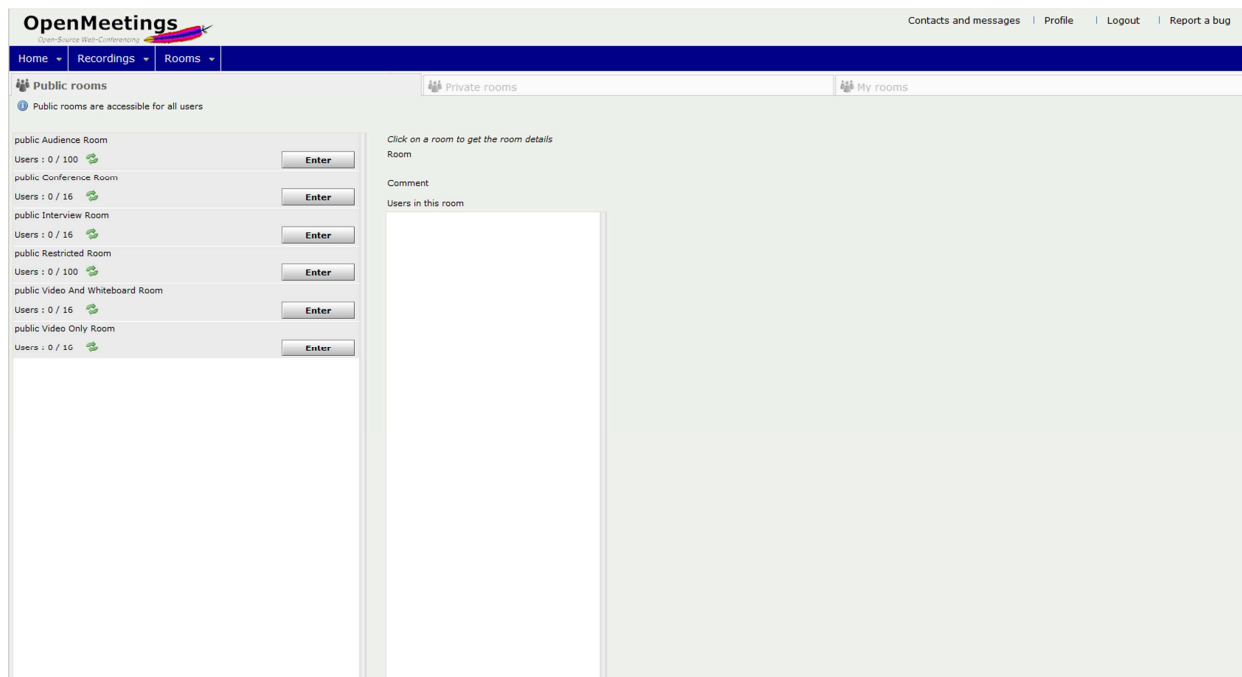
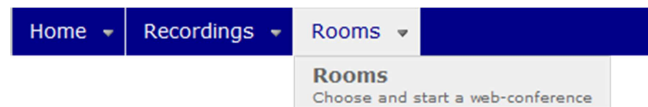


Figure 10 – Rooms window

As you can see, a list of rooms already exists, they are automatically created by installing OpenMeetings and only if the administrator decides it. Maybe the list on your system will not be exactly the same as the picture shown above. There is a second tab 'Private room' which, as its name says, displays all the private rooms. As explained above, it is possible that, as a user, you are part of a usergroup and in this case, you will only see the list of private rooms of your usergroup.

7.1 Types of rooms

There are several types of rooms:

A conference room is a room where everyone shares his camera and microphone and has access to the whiteboard and can manage files. The session recording records the whole screen.

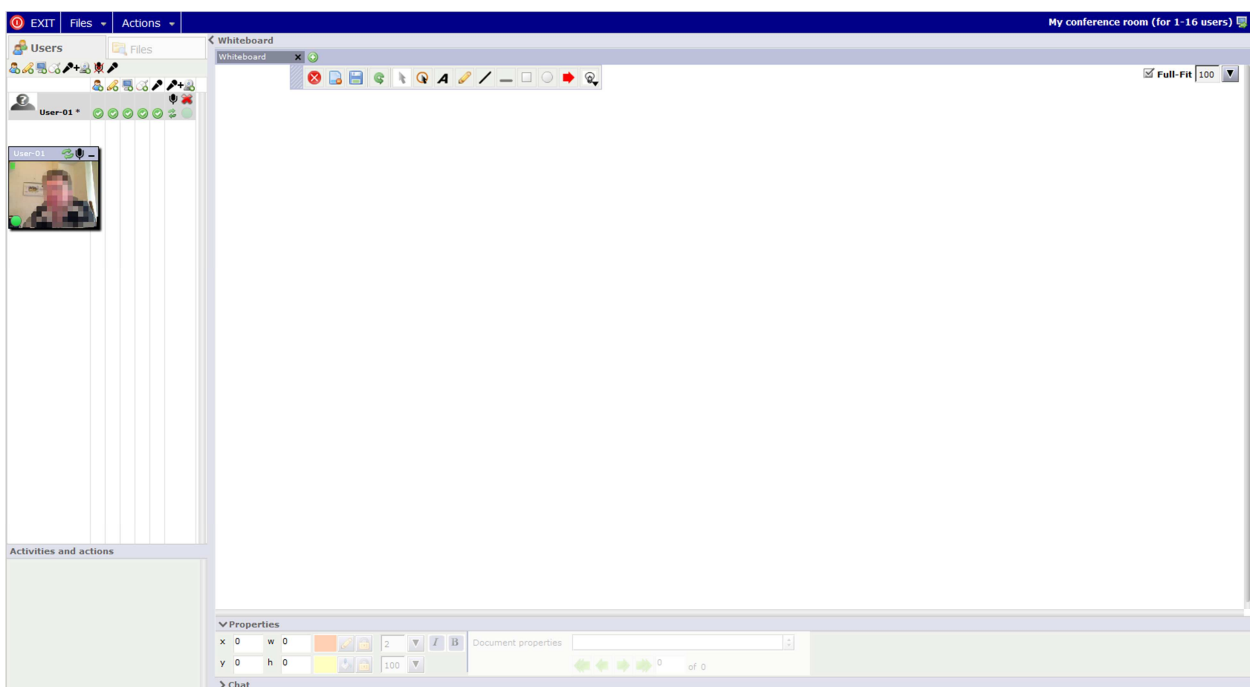


Figure 11 – Conference room

A restricted room is a room where only the moderator can speak, use the whiteboard or upload files. The moderator also has the ability to mute/unmute a user microphone, grant/deny the right to the user to interact with the whiteboard or share his screen. By default it is a room that can hold more participants because there is a restriction on the use of resources.

By default the user, only has access to a pointer (equivalent to raising your hand in a classroom). The session recording records the whole screen.

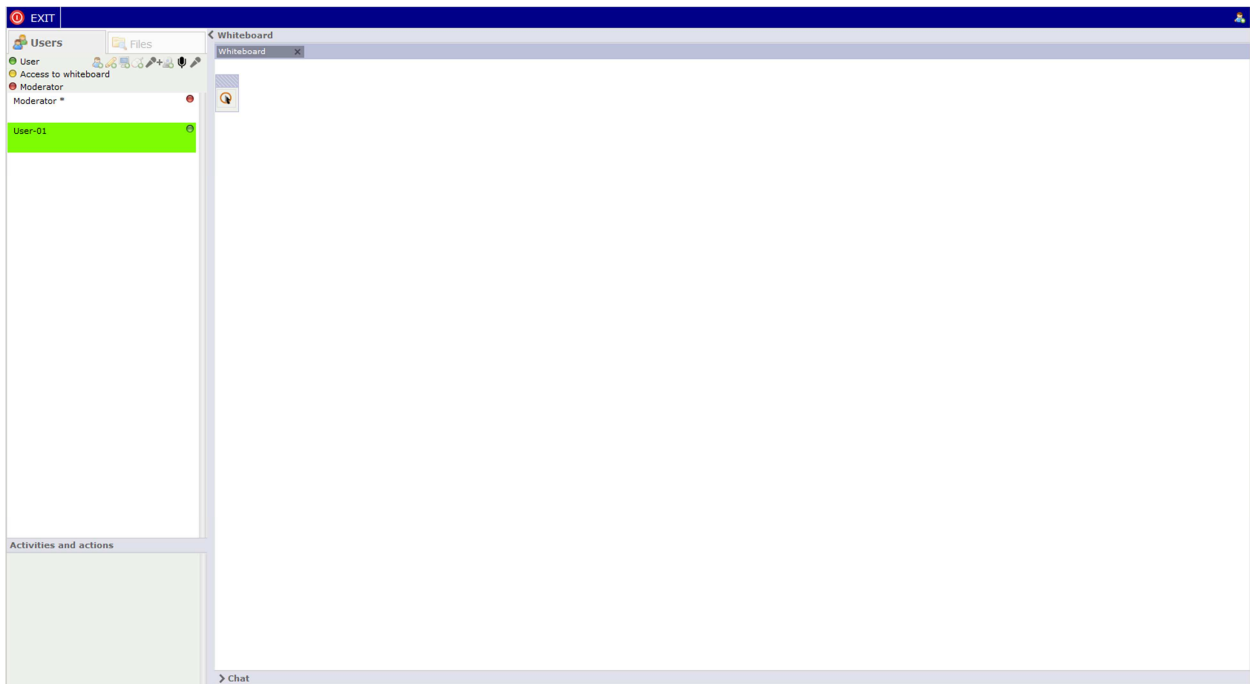


Figure 12 – Restricted room

An interview room is a room where only two users can share video and audio (there may be more than two users in the room and the moderator will then enable or disable the cameras and microphones as he wants) and in which there is no whiteboard, 'Actions' menu or screen sharing possibility. The session recording only records video and audio.

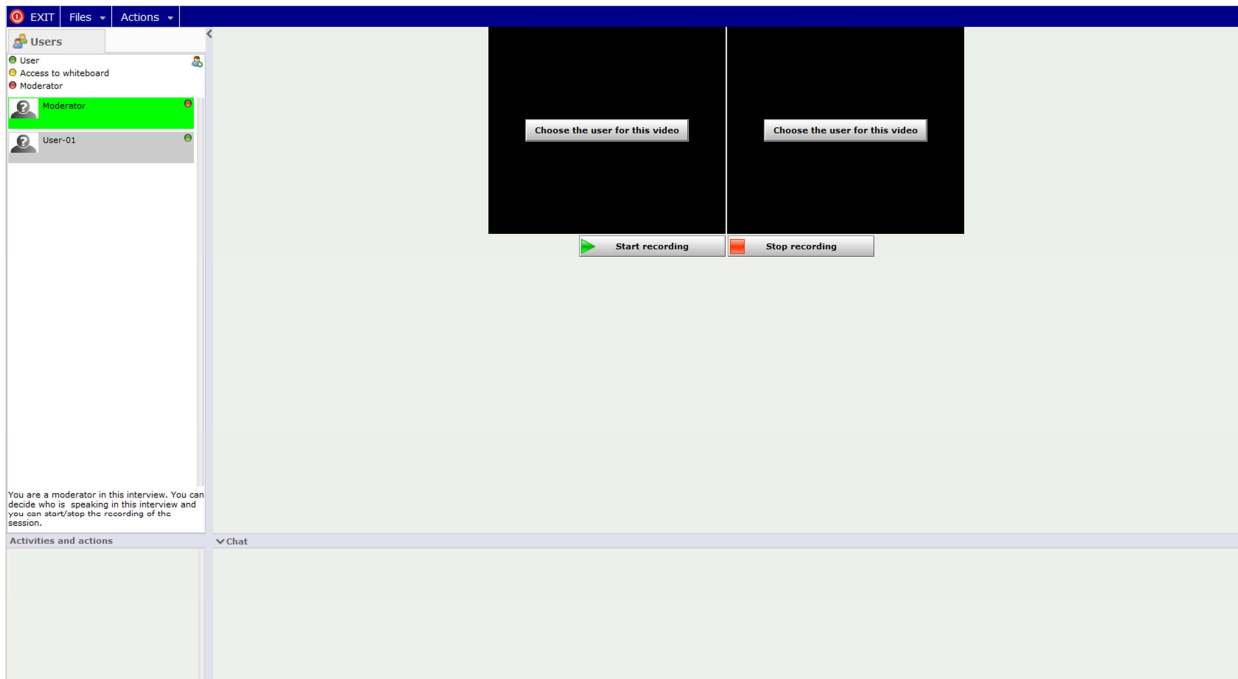


Figure 13 – Interview room

The video and whiteboard room and video only room are rooms in which the video is enabled by default when you enter.

7.2 Entering a room

To join a conference in a room, click the button next to the desired room in the list of public or private rooms.

When done, a window will appear. This is where you decide whether you will use audio and video, audio only or video only by choosing the corresponding option in the first drop down menu. The two drop-down menus below allow you to choose your camera and your microphone and you can test them before entering the room.

To do this, choose your camera and microphone in the two drop down lists and click the button which will record a few seconds. You can then check whether recording went well and so if your hardware is working properly.

The last menu allows you to choose the resolution of the camera. The choice of the camera resolution is particularly important because it will influence the transmission quality

When you are ready or if you do not want to test your hardware, simply click on the button to enter the room. If you no longer want this window to appear, you can disable it in your profile (see page 3 of this manual) or check the Do not ask again box.

The higher the resolution you choose, the more bandwidth will be required and therefore the session will be resource-intensive. The choice of the resolution depends on several factors like the quality of your connection, the quality and power of the server, the number of people in the room and the quality of their connections and the resolution of their cameras. You must therefore try to find a compromise on the video size and quality of transmission. Some tests will help you quickly get a sense of the resolution to choose.

When you enter for the first time in a room you will see a small warning window of Adobe Flash Player. This window requests the permission for Openmeetings to use your camera and your microphone. You should of course say yes, otherwise you will not see or hear anyone in the room.



7.3 Possible actions and available tools in a room

7.3.1 User rights

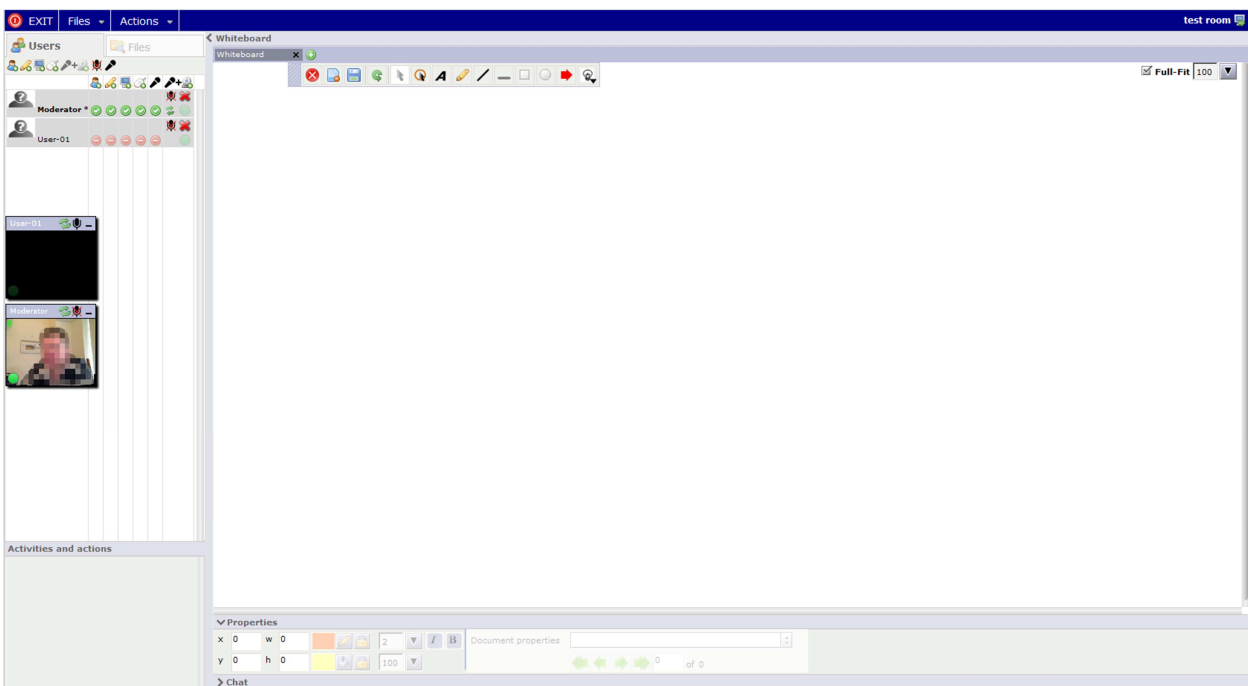









Figure 15 – Tools for the moderator

On the left side of the window is the list of users in the room, the video pods and the icons to give or remove permissions to a user.



The first row of icons below the 'Users' tab concerns you. The first four are enabled by default because you are the moderator of the room, let review them. The first icon  indicates that you are a moderator, the second one  indicates that you have access to the whiteboard, the third one  that you can share/record your screen and the fourth one  indicates that you have the right to remote control during a screen sharing.

If, when you enter the room you do not see your own video, click the fifth icon,  it allows you to share your camera, this will open the 'Choose device' window (see page 10). The sixth icon  allows you to mute or unmute your microphone and the seventh and final icon  allows you to get the exclusive audio, i.e. it mutes the microphones of all other participants. This can also be done by clicking in the middle of any video pod or by pressing the F12 key (by default).

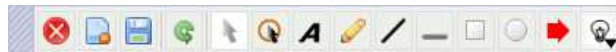
Under these icons is the list of participants in the room, including you. To the right of your name, in each column, you can see an icon indicating what you are allowed to do, 🟢 (in theory everything since you are a moderator). In the last column you can see an icon shaped like a double arrow, 🔄 it allows you to restart your camera or change your audio or video by opening the window of choice for the device (see page 10). You find the same icon next to your name in your video pod where it has the same function, and next to the name of each participant in different video pods, where it will synchronize audio and video with the corresponding participant.

Next to the name of each participant, you should see, by default, a series of icons representing an interdiction sign, 🚫 this means that the user does not have the right to do certain things. It is you who give him such rights by clicking on its icon. So if you click the first 🚫 icon, you'll give the user the moderator status (use with care because it means he can do anything, even kick you out of the room). You can give him the right to access the whiteboard, 📌 the right to share his screen, 🖥️ remote control 🖱️ or the right to give the exclusive audio. 🎤 Finally, you can also see an icon shaped like a cross, 🚫 with which you can eject the user and close his session.














7.3.2 Whiteboard

A big part of the room window is occupied by the whiteboard. The whiteboard is a space where you can write, draw, point or place documents.

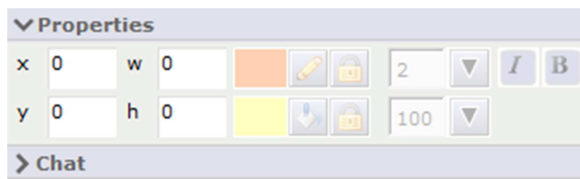
Next to the word 'Whiteboard' you can see a green cross, 🟢 It allows you to add a second whiteboard (or more). Below is the whiteboard tool bar.



You can move this bar by clicking in the shaded area to the left of the bar and moving the mouse while holding the button down. The icons in the toolbar are quite self-explaining, here is a brief description.

At the bottom of the main window, there is a 'Chat' tab and a 'Properties' tab in which you can modify some parameters of the text or objects created using the tools on the toolbar, such as changing the text color or line color, change the fill color of a shape or change the size of a text amongst other things.





In the upper right corner of the window is the zoom, you can adjust it to your liking, knowing that if you scroll vertically with the mouse wheel, it will also affect the display of other participants. The checkbox 'Full-Fit', if enabled, adjusts the content of the whiteboard for all users independently of their screen resolution.

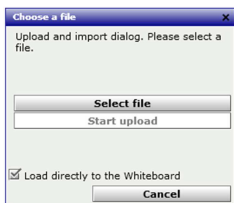
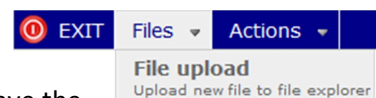
7.3.3 Uploading a document on the whiteboard

One of the great interests of the whiteboard is the possibility to upload and show documents on it, different formats accepted are:

.bmp, .doc, .docx, .dpx, .exr, .gif, .ico, .jpg, .jpeg, .odp, .ods, .odt, .pcd, .pcds, .pdf, .png, .ppt, .pptx, .ps, .psd, .rtf, .svg, .sxc, .sxi, .sxw, .tga, .tiff, .ttf, .txt, .wpd, .wpg, .xcf, .xls, .xlsx

To do this you have two options, the first is to click on the 'Files' tab next to the 'Users' tab. There you can decide where you want to place your file, if you drop it in 'My Files' folder, it can not be downloaded by other users. If you put the file in 'Room files', the other participants will be able to download it by double clicking on the version they want as long as the moderator gave them the right to access the whiteboard. Indeed, when you drop a file, it is automatically converted to a .pdf file. It is therefore possible to download the original file or the converted version. You can create subfolders by clicking the 'Add Folder' icon  to submit your file, click the green cross  icon.

The second way is to click in the menu on the 'Files' tab and then on 'File upload', with this method, the file will be automatically placed in the 'Room files' folder and therefore accessible to other users if they have the right to access the whiteboard.



The next step is to select the desired file on your computer and click 'Start upload', the file will be imported into the system and converted to a .pdf file. You can also load the file directly to the whiteboard, or not, if you wish to prepare the various files for a future presentation. If you uncheck this box, your file will be placed on the system under the 'Files' menu and converted, you can then later drag and drop the files to the whiteboard when you need them.

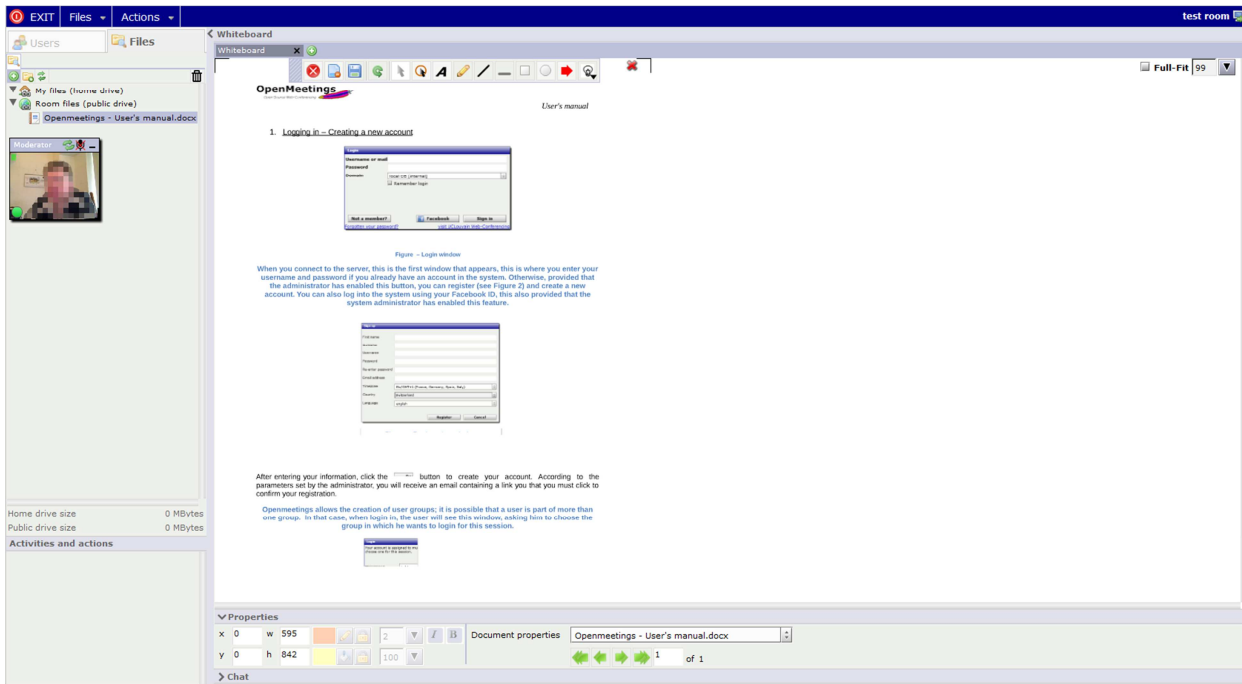
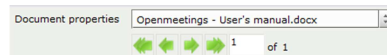


Figure 16 – Uploaded document

Here you see the uploaded file on the whiteboard, in case you have unchecked the box 'Load directly to the whiteboard', you can put the file on the whiteboard by selecting your file on the left and drag it on the whiteboard by holding the mouse button.



You can see at the bottom center of the window a set of icons to help you navigate in your document.



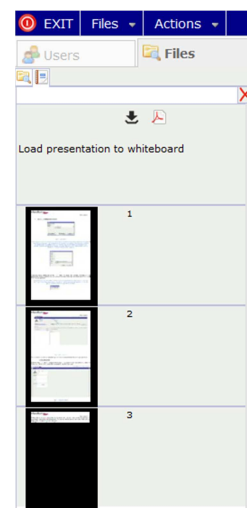
7.3.4 Downloading a document from the whiteboard



As mentioned earlier in section 7.3.3, if you load a document in the 'Room files' folder, it can be downloaded by other participants of the room if they have received the right to access the whiteboard.

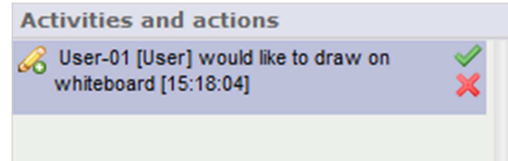
To download a file, either double click the desired file name on the left side or click the icon 

In the new window, you have two icons, the first one  allows you to retrieve the document in its original form, the second one  allows you to retrieve the .pdf converted document.

You can also view the different pages of the document, this is another way to navigate through your presentation, but unlike the set of icons above, here you have the opportunity to select a specific page with a single click.

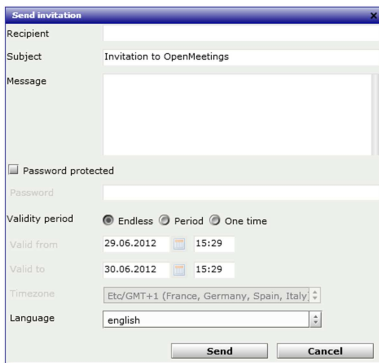
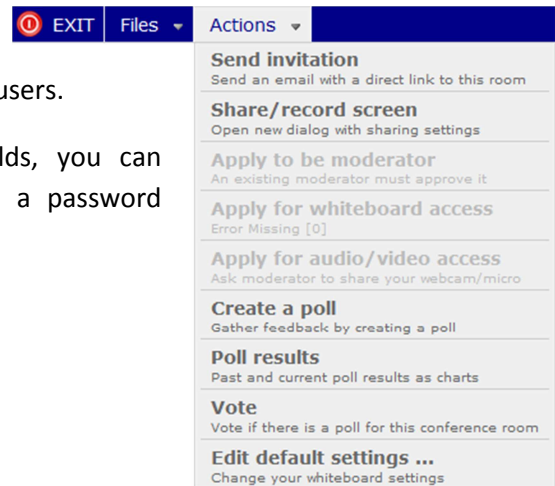


In the main window of the room, under the user list on the left side is a small space called 'Activities and actions'; this is where the different messages and user requests will appear. If a user requests something, such as the right to access the whiteboard, a message will appear here and the moderator will have the ability to accept  or refuse  the request.



In the menu of the conference room is the 'Actions' tab; there are several options that we will go over rapidly.

Firstly, you can send an invitation to another person. This possibility is only accessible to moderators, not to regular users.



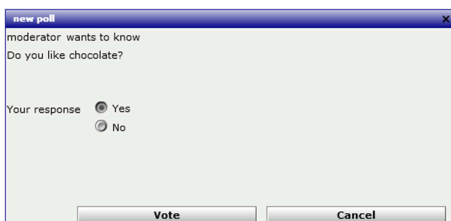
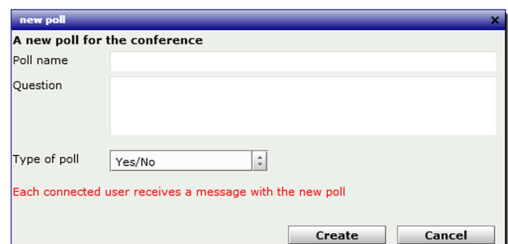
Simply fill out the fields, you can protect the room with a password and set a validity period.

The options to share or record your screen are described in sections 7.3.5 and 7.3.6

The following three options are available for normal users only and allow them to ask for the moderation status, ask to access the whiteboard or ask to share their audio/video. They have the same functionality as the icons seen earlier in section 7.3.1.

The next option allows you to create a simple survey. Simply enter a name, the question, and choose the type of poll, limited to two 'Yes/No' or 'numeric from 1 to 10'.

Each user will receive an invitation to vote.

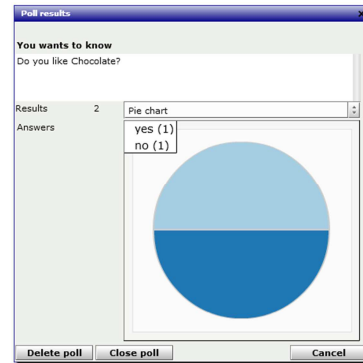


If you want to vote yourself, you can do so by choosing the 'Vote' option in the 'Actions' menu above.

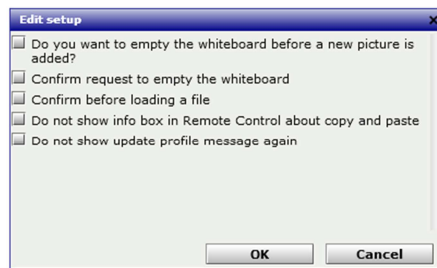
You can then see the results of the survey by going in the 'Actions' menu and by selecting 'Poll results'.

You will see the answers and the results in a form of pie chart or simple bar graphic.



You also have the 'Close poll' button which allows you to close the survey so that nobody can vote anymore.

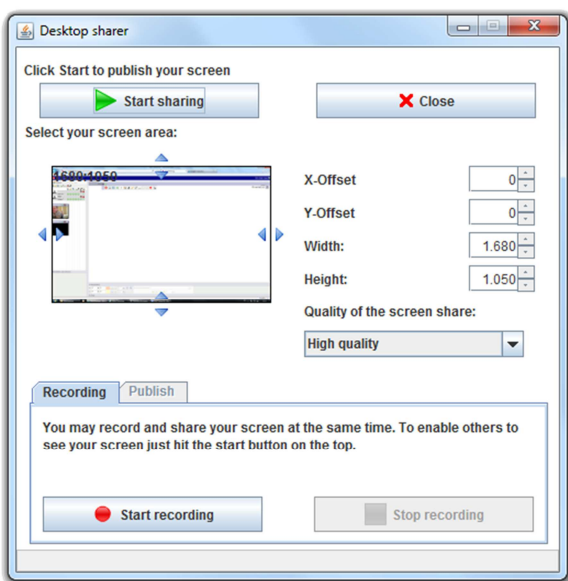



The last two options are a SIP dialer for one, (this allows you to call a telephone number connected in a SIP environment. This option is only visible if the SIP option has been enabled by the administrator) and 'Edit setup' for the other.





7.3.5 Screen sharing

In the upper right corner of the main window of the room is the icon  with which you can start a screen sharing. Screen sharing allows you to show your screen or part of it to the other users of the room. In the window that appears, you can, using the double blue arrows  define the area you want to share, and you can also set the quality of sharing.



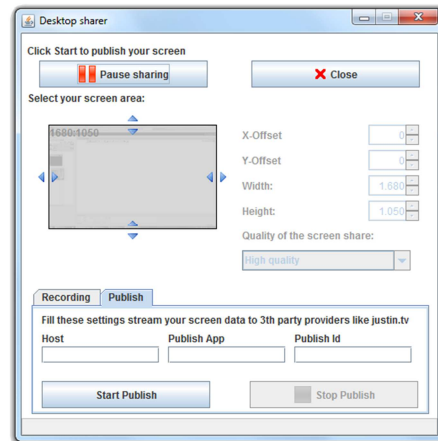
When you click the  button, a message appears on the screens of other participants allowing them to accept or refuse to see the sharing.




During a screen sharing you can take control of the PC that is sharing the screen if you are a moderator or the moderator gave you the right to access the whiteboard  and the right to remote control. 

You also have the possibility to stream your live screen to a third party live video website.

To do this, start sharing your screen, then click the 'Publish' tab and fill the required settings according to the third party website to which you want to stream. Finally, click on the button 'Start Publish'.



7.3.6 Session recording

This window also allows you to start recording the session by clicking the  button. It will record everything that happens on the whiteboard as well as video and audio.

At the end of the session, when you leave the room, you can view and retrieve your recording, to do so click the 'Recordings' tab in the menu on your main page.

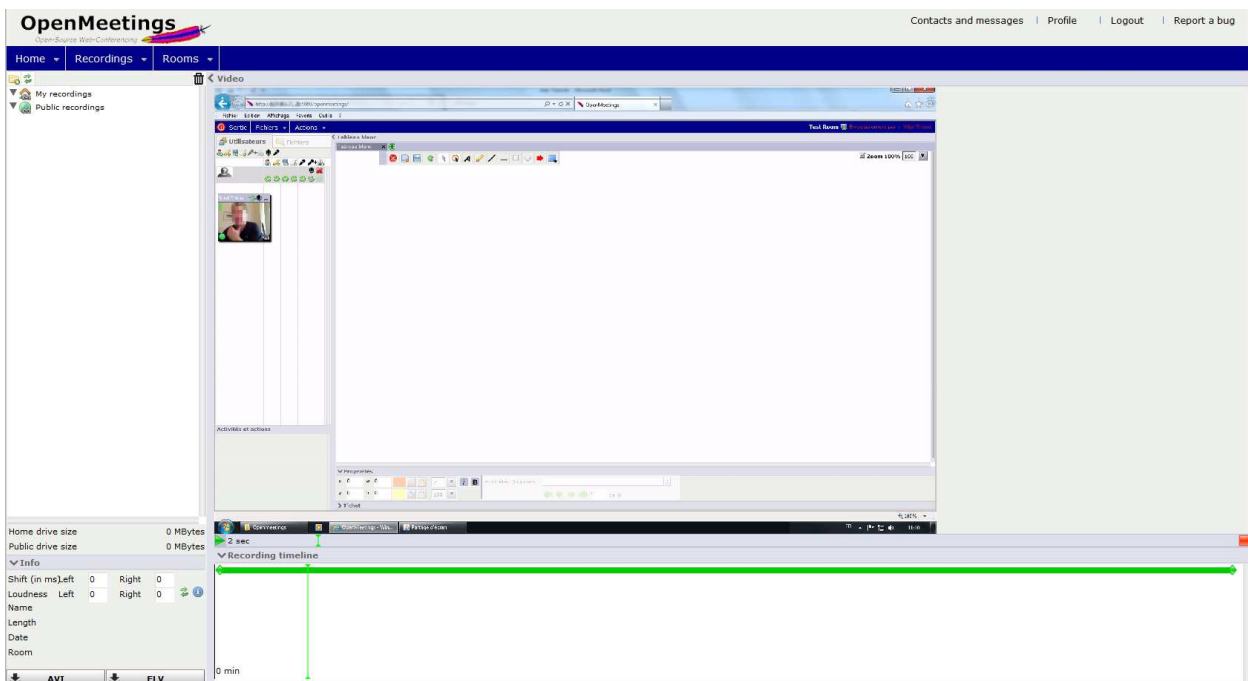
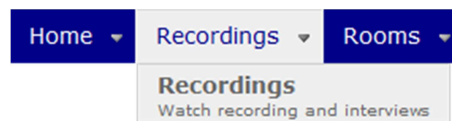
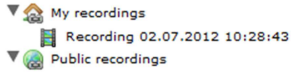





Figure 17 – Recordings window

This is the window where you can view and retrieve your recordings. By default, when you record a session, the recording is saved in the 'My recordings' folder which is not accessible to other users. If you want to share your recording you can move it in the 'Public recordings' by clicking the desired recording and dragging it in the 'Public recordings' folder. (Be warned that this means that any user will have access to the recording, even someone who was not in the room with you.)

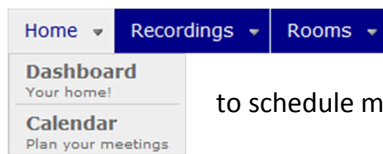


In the main window you can see the video and below it, you see the recording timeline. The green line indicates the microphone is on, you see also the recording length and a 'Play'  and 'Stop'  icon.

On the left side of the window you have some information about the recording such as the length or size, as well as two buttons that allow you to download the recording in .avi or .flv formats.

Same as with files, you can delete the recording when you no longer need it. To do this you simply select it and drag it into the trash bin. 

8. The calendar or how to set up a meeting



In the 'Home' tab of the menu on your main page is the option 'Calendar', this will open the calendar window where you will be able to schedule meetings and invite participants.

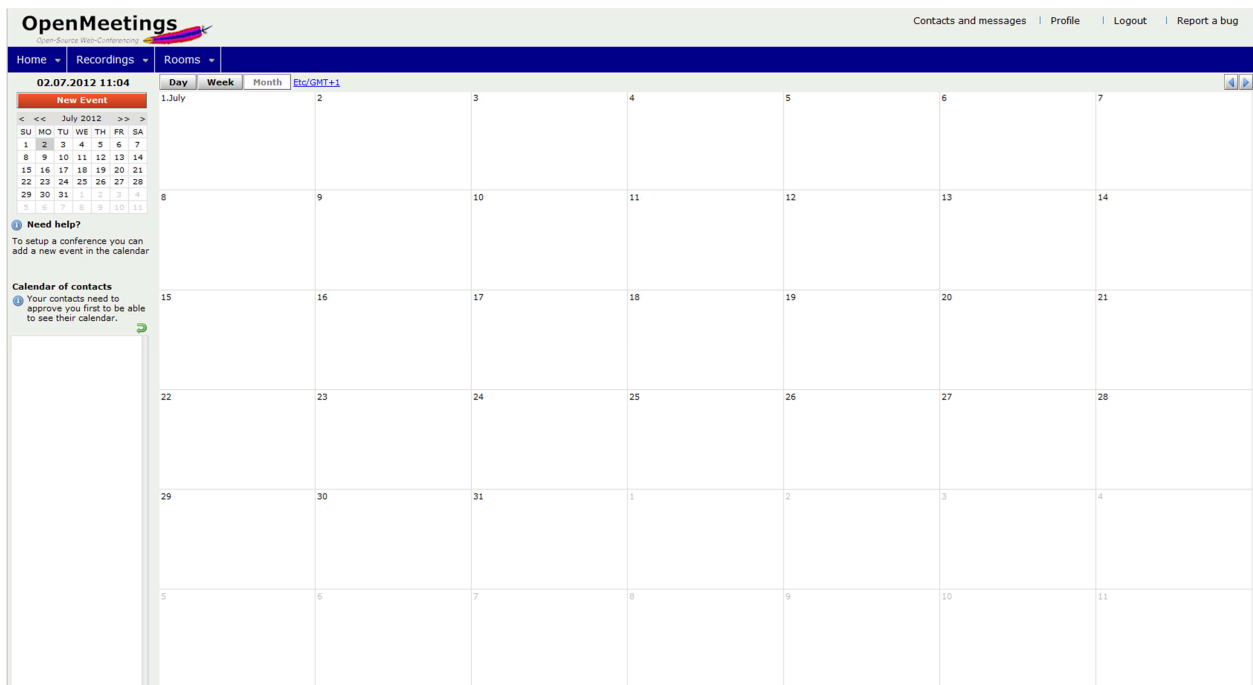



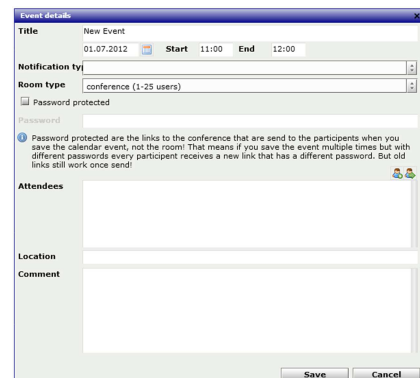


Figure 18 - The calendar

Like any calendar, you can change the view by clicking the 'Day', 'Week' or 'Month' buttons. Top right, two arrows  let you navigate between dates.

To schedule a new meeting, you simply click on the desired date in the center of the window or select the date in the calendar at the top left and click on the 'New Event' button. Enter a name for the event, set the start time and end time, select the reminder mode (none, iCal or simple email), choose the type of room desired and a password if it should be password protected. Then you can add attendees: you can either choose them from the list of known users (registered in the system)  or add external  participants (you must then provide their names and emails).



Do not forget to add a little comment that will accompany the invitation and explain the purpose of the meeting. By clicking on the 'Save' button, an e-mail is sent to each participant with a direct link to the room. That link will be valid only during the defined time. Participants will not be able to enter the room before the time.
